Anti-Oppression, Anti-Racism, and Multicultural Training

At the 2021 April meeting of the RECC, the committee elected to work with a consulting group and we formally initiated a relationship with MMAPEA Consulting in August 2021. Our collective goals were to 'discover and assess how the RECC might adjust and redesign (as well as continue) various practices and procedures that support an impactful and dynamic process for RECC candidates, in addition to help[ing] the RECC to identify opportunities to embed JEDI [Justice, Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion] throughout its operations and culture' (language taken from MMAPEU Consulting's Cultural Assessment Report, included in appendix). In the following months, MMAPEU Consulting collected qualitative and quantitative data via focus groups, a web-based survey and individual one-on-one interviews with organizational stakeholders. The first outcome of the analysis of this data resulted in the adoption of a new Mission, Vision, and Core Values statement for the RECC (included in appendix).

- Creating mutual accountability between religious professionals seeking credentialing and the work of the RECC that manifests grace-filled, respectful, kind, empathetic, and dynamic professional development experiences.
- A process that provides the opportunity and supports any and all of those seeking a path towards professional religious education in a way that nurtures all aspects of who they are, and provides access to credentialing in a respectful, nurturing and holistic way.
